












Who are Connected Hubs?


Connected Hubs is part of Our Rural Future – the Government of Ireland's national policy for rural Ireland, and is funded by the Department of Rural and Community Development.

The Connected Hubs programme connects 360+ independent hubs in Ireland. It helps hubs to support each other, market and promote their services, and provides the Air BnB-style booking platform www.connectedhubs.ie.

Connected Hubs brings new audiences to the hub network, raising it's profile nationally and internationally and developing ways in which it can support government policy in areas such as enterprise, community and climate action.

Connected Hubs does not own or operate any hubs and the service we provide is free of charge to hubs and users.

What is a hub?

A Hub is a facility that provides a suite of services to support individuals, businesses and local communities. These services include physical space such as coworking, private office space, meeting and training rooms. Hubs also provide access to specialist facilities like podcast suites, shared kitchens.

Many hubs also act as a locus and stimulator for entrepreneurial activity by running events, providing mentoring and guidance, and running programmes such as start-up accelerators. Some large specialist hubs may be sector specific such as Bia Innovator for the food sector, or CREW Innovation Hub for the Createch sector.

For SMEs and large organisations hubs act as a gateway to new talent and a facilitator of remote / hybrid working strategies.

Almost all of the hubs in the Network are independent businesses, who provide different services according to who their target audience is. Some hubs are privately owned, but the majority are owned and run by local authorities, social enterprises or community groups.






Where are the hubs?

As of May 2024 there are 360+ hubs in the Connected Hubs network, distributed across the whole country. More hubs are joining every week.

A <u>CSO survey</u> in 2022 found that on average a residential dwelling in the State is just 5.6km from a remote work hub, although distances in rural areas may be a bit further.

Social engagement

Compared to working from home, hubs offer an improved social environment which is better for long term health and wellbeing. Hub members are more in touch with community events and news and have increased opportunities to get involved.

Reduce the commute

Save on travel costs, time commitments and environmental impact. Using a hub close to home means less time commuting, more time for work and non-work activities, reduced carbon emissions by shortening commute journeys and using shared building resources.

Work-life separation

Working in a professional office space like a hub means helps keep your home life and work life separate, creating a better balance for employees, and business owners.

Fully Remote organisations: Use hubs for team meet ups, project sprints and meeting with clients and suppliers.



Hybrid organisations: Use hubs to provide a local base for employees close to their home. Some hybrid organisations choose to establish smaller regional bases in hubs where employees can get together - a 'hub in a hub'. Hubs are used for team meetings, one-to-ones.



Traditional organisations: Use hubs to open regional basis to access new talent and client markets. Employees who travel frequently may use hubs as a space to work from, or meet with clients on an ad hoc basis.
