
About the Amazon of Europe area

Spanning across the border regions of Austria, Croatia, Hungary, Serbia and Slovenia, the lower courses of the Drava and Mura rivers and related sections of the Danube are among Europe's most ecologically important riverine areas: the so-called »Amazon of Europe« (hereinafter »AoE«). The rivers form a 700 kilometres long green belt connecting almost 8,499.28 km² of highly valuable natural and cultural landscapes from all five countries and form a symbol of unity by being the world's first five country Transboundary UNESCO Biosphere Reserve »Mura-Drava-Danube«.



The area represents the largest and most preserved freeflowing river system in Central Europe. Pristine natural beauty, endangered habitats and diverse cultural traditions have enormous potential for sustainable tourism, while underdeveloped border regions face a lack of capacities, unemployment and emigration.





Location and basic characteristics of the AoE area The Amazon of Europe passes along the Mura, Drava and

Danube rivers through five countries (Austria, Slovenia, Croatia, Hungary and Serbia), 11 NUTS 3* regions and 12 protected areas. The area stretches across 11 regions: Eastern Styria in Austria, the Pomurska region in Slovenia, Međimurje County, Varaždin County, Osijek-Baranja County, Koprivnica - Križevci County and Virovitica-Podravina County in Croatia, Zala County, Somogy County and Baranya County in Hungary and West Bačka District in Serbia. It covers an area of 22,740.29 km² with a population of 2,084,658 people. The NUTS 3 regions in the Amazon of Europe area cover 8.5% of the total surface of the five countries in which they're located (Austria, Slovenia, Croatia, Hungary and Serbia) and therefore, they represent a substantial part of their national territories. The largest NUTS 3 region in the AoE area is Somogy County with a size of 6,065 km² covering 21 % of the whole area. It is followed by Baranya County (4,430 km² i.e. 15 % of the AoE area), Osijek-Baranja County (4,149 km² i.e. 14 % of the AoE area) and Zala County (3,785 km2 i.e. 13 % of the

the Pomurje region with a size of 1,337 km 2 covering 4,6 % of the AoE area. The surface shares of the other four regions vary from 6 % to 8.4 % of the whole AoE area.

The area connects 12 protected areas along the rivers highlighting their ecological values including the world famous »Kopački Rit« Nature Park at the Danube-Drava confluence, »Drava-Mura« Regional Park in Croatia, »Gornje Podunavlje« Special Nature Reserve in Serbia and the »Danube-Drava« National Park in Hungary as well as – Biosphere Reserve Mura in Slovenia and Natura 2000 Site and Protected Landscape, Mura in Austria. This stunning riverine landscape contains both amazing natural beauty and rich cultural heritage, thus representing a great tourist potential.

This area is among the largest alluvial complexes in Europe. Despite numerous man-made changes in the past, this stunning river landscape hosts an amazing biological diversity and is a hotspot of rare natural habitats such as large floodplain forests, river islands, gravel and sand banks, side branches and oxbow lakes. These habitats are home to many protected and rare species of animals and plants.

In addition to high levels of biodiversity, the river and floodplain areas are vital to the local communities. Local fishermen rely on the fish populations for their livelihoods. The extensive floodplains lower the risk of floods, secure favourable groundwater conditions and self-purification of water which is essential for drinking water, forests and agriculture. People also enjoy recreational activities along the rivers such as walking, swimming, fishing, or canoeing. This landscape offers a shared opportunity to pursue sustainable and nature-based development, which will also be in line with the principles of nature conservation and cultural heritage and based on active participation of the local population.

5-country Biosphere Reserve

For almost 30 years, nature conservationists have been working towards the preservation of the largest seminatural river and floodplain ecosystem in Central Europe along the Mura, Drava, and Danube Rivers within a transboundary Biosphere Reserve. The International Coordinating Council of the UNESCO's Man and the Biosphere Programme declared in September 2021 the Mura-Drava-Danube Transboundary Biosphere Reserve (TBR MDD) as the world's first 5-country biosphere reserve. Stretching across Austria, Slovenia, Croatia, Hungary and Serbia, the reserve covers a total area of 930,000 hectares extending along 700 km of the Mura, Drava, and Danube rivers, which makes it the largest riverine biosphere reserve in Europe. It comprises about 300,000 hectares of core and buffer zones (existing protected area network) and around 700,000 hectares of transition zones. The core zone is the ecological backbone of the reserve. It primarily covers the river and floodplains areas which are mostly situated within flood control dykes.

The goals and measures in the core zone are pre-dominantly focused on the preservation of natural habitats, species, and processes as well as the restoration of already degraded areas. The buffer zone extends along the rivers outside

the inundation zone. It is characterised by a mosaic of cultivated land and village areas and also contains some smaller detached zones like oxbow lakes, fish ponds and small wetlands. Extensive agriculture such as cattle grazing, hay making, organic production, local products marketing and ecotourism are some of the key activities in this area. The outer transition zone provides regional economical and scientific support to the buffer zone. The majority of towns and universities are situated within this area. The long-term vision for the TBR MDD is to jointly maintain and promote a fully natural and dynamic river ecosystem as the basis for the rich biodiversity and sustainable livelihoods and life quality of local people. The aim is, while jointly conserving the river and floodplains, to maintain and ensure greater benefits for local people, reaching from high quality drinking water, natural flood protection, traditional land use, climate buffer, sustainable business to recreation. Under UNESCO protection within the Man and the Biosphere programme, biosphere reserves are model regions where nature conservation goes hand in hand with sustainable regional development.


Europe's largest protected riverine area



The UNESCO designation of the world's first 5-country biosphere reserve on 15
September 2021 represents a historic step towards a new era for people and nature in the Mura-Drava-Danube region and overall Europe. This landmark cross-border designation is a powerful demonstration of a shared green vision that builds on and reinforces, both, regional cooperation and unity in Europe.

Wildlife and vegetation

Despite numerous man-made changes in the past, this stunning river landscape hosts an amazing biological diversity and is a hotspot of rare natural habitats such as large floodplain forests, river islands, gravel and sand banks, side branches and oxbow lakes. These habitats are home to the highest density of breeding pairs of white-tailed eagles in Continental Europe and other endangered species such as the little tern, black stork, beaver, otter and the nearly extinct ship sturgeon. There are also many rare fish on a European scale, such as sturgeon, nesting sites for many endangered bird species such as sand martins. Every year, more than 250,000 migratory waterfowls use the rivers to rest and to feed.





The Amazon of Europe hosts a variety of animal species. Floodplain forests are inhabited by red deer, roe deer and wild boars, foxes, martens, and other smaller animals. Rivers, side branches and lakes are habitats of many fish



species. The available data shows that there are 69 fish species recorded in the Drava River only. Some of them are Northern pike, pikeperch, asp, zingel, European mudminnow and others. The Mura, Drava and Danube Rivers were once important habitats for the starlet, a sturgeon species that is now the most endangered species group on planet Earth. Rivers and connected habitats are also living spaces for otters and beavers.

The most prominent and most researched group of species in the Amazon of Europe are birds. The Amazon of Europe hosts the largest continental breeding population of white-tailed eagle. It is a resting site for more than 250,000 water

birds during migration and also a breeding area for many endangered and strictly protected species like the little tern. Steep bank and gravel/sand bar breeders like sand martins, European bee-eaters, kingfishers, terns, little ringed plovers, and sandpipers still find suitable nesting habitats on the Amazon of Europe rivers even though their numbers are decreasing due to river regulation, building of hydropower plants, lack of sediment and other human-related impacts. Black storks, cormorants, grey herons and white egrets are some of the other important birds that can be seen along the Amazon of Europe.

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When to travel

The area is interesting and worth a visit in all seasons. The most suitable time for cycling, water sports and outdoor activities spans from mid-May to the beginning of October. May is probably the ultimate choice for this adventure — think lush green meadows, blossoming fruit trees and moderate temperatures. The peak season is in Summer; but even the summer heat is easily bearable with the cooling headwinds in your face, and of course both the rivers and the swimming lakes offer plenty of opportunities for a refreshing dip along the way — where allowed. Be sure to





check the weather report for afternoon showers, so you can set off a little earlier in the morning if need be. In the summer, due to the heat, we recommend carrying out activities in the morning or in the afternoon. Don't forget about rehydration and always have enough liquid with you. Autumn with crisp, refreshing air, forests bursting with colour, pleasantly cool temperatures can be also a fantastic time for a journey on the Amazon of Europe, as long as you come well-prepared for the lower temperatures. In winter, keep in mind that some attractions are closed.

Low impact travelling

- Leave no trace, take care of nature.
- Take all trash, leftover food and litter with you, or dispose of it in a designated area, recycle when possible.
- Keep your bike clean to prevent the spread of weeds and plant diseases.
- Avoid animals and growing crops; avoid cycling through meadows or forests, unless there are signposted paths. If not possible, keep contact to an absolute minimum.
- Never feed animals. Feeding wildlife influences their health, alters natural behaviours, and exposes them to predators and other dangers.
- Avoid wildlife during sensitive times (e.g. mating, nesting, raising young, or winter).

- Seeing wildlife in their natural habitat is a privilege; respect them and the habitats in which they live, and do not endanger them (avoid stepping on gravel bars, steep banks, etc.). For the best viewing experiences use binoculars or a camera with zoom.
- Rest, picnic, camp, swim or make fire only in places where it is allowed.
- If you stop for a swim or go for a guided water tour, avoid stepping on gravel or sand islands, as these are refuges for wild nesting birds.
- Preserve the past: examine, but do not touch cultural or historic structures and artefacts.
- Let nature's sounds prevail. Avoid loud voices and noises.

A brief overview of the history of the area of the lower reaches of the Drava and Mura rivers and the middle Danube

In the areas along the lower reaches of the Drava and Mura rivers and the middle Danube, for centuries European, regional and local roads were at a crossroads, causing a collision of compatible and diverse cultures of numerous nations. The longitudinal connection with the southern Drava valley, which from ancient times connected the west with the east (and vice versa), as well as the transversal directions that crossed it from north to south, was extremely important for the historical development and for the creation of the local settlement grid.. The first permanent medieval settlements were created on these routes. It seems that in stable times the majority of settlements were concentrated on slightly elevated terrain, but during times of instability the settlements would move to impassable, swampy areas closer to rivers.

The Sereti, Serapili, Jasi, Andizeti and Amantini are the first peoples known by name who lived along the lower reaches of the Drava and Mura rivers and the middle Danube. Some researchers believe that they were descendants of a Late Bronze Age culture, which lasted from the beginning of the 13th century BC to the end of the 8th century BC. At the beginning of the 3rd century BC, the Celts moved in and continued to live alongside the natives. They were later

joined by the Scythians, whose traces were found south of the Drava, near Jalžabet.

In the beginning, the areas along the lower reaches of the Drava and Mura rivers and the middle Danube were the sphere of interest of Rome only, but in the 1st century military occupation followed. The main concern of the Romans was how to build a road network in the newly founded province of Pannonia so that they could more easily control the conquered tribes. Northly and southly, local or vicinal routes connected to the main Podravina road route from Poetovia (Ptuj) via Iovia (Ludbreg) to Mursa (Osijek). In 379, with the permission of Emperor Gratian, the first groups of barbarian peoples – Goths, Alans and Huns – settled in the Roman province of Pannonia. Since then,



Pannonia was often ravaged and plundered, and its roads were penetrated by barbarians from the north.

In addition to the remnants of the earlier Avars, Slavs, and probably Gepids who survived the fall of the Avar Khaganate, numerous new colonists from the west began to arrive in Pannonia. The areas around the lower reaches of the Drava and Mura rivers and the middle Danube became a kind of »melting pot«, in which the Slavs had the upper hand. The ethnic picture stabilized for a long time with the coming of the Hungarian population at the end of the 9th century and the formation of the Hungarian state.

From the second half of the 16th century and throughout the 17th century, these areas were marked by conflicts between the Habsburg Monarchy and the Ottoman Empire.





The life of people in the pre-industrial era depended on the natural environment to which the population was exposed. During the 18th and 19th centuries, people tried to defend themselves against the encroachment of the rivers on their settlements and roads, livestock and arable fields, by cutting meanders, building embankments and digging drainage channels. It remains a question to what extent the works on river regulation made the population happy, since their way of life in the pre-industrial era was deeply dependent on the benefits the rivers provided as well as the harm they caused. Regulating the rivers at first glance eliminates the damages; but at the same time the benefits and the lifestyle of the population who were in complete harmony with nature are also irreversibly lost.

After 1918/1919 parts of the area along the lower reaches of the Drava and Mura rivers and the middle Danube became part of Yugoslavia, Austria and Hungary. After the breakup of Yugoslavia, independent Slovenia, Croatia and Serbia assumed responsibility for their parts of the Drava, Mura and Danube rivers. Stronger protection of nature has been institutionalized since 1976, when the Kopački rit nature park was established in Croatia. In Hungary, the Danube-Drava National Park was established in 1996. With the recent declaration of the Mura-Drava-Danube world biosphere reserve by UNESCO, the lower reaches of the Drava and Mura rivers and part of the middle Danube became part of the largest protected river area in Europe.

Culture

The area's cultural heritage is the evidence of a vibrant past with various cultural influences from east and west. The presence of the Ottoman and the Habsburg empires is visible in the architecture of many old cities in the region. Croatians, Hungarians, Serbs and even some Austrian, German or Czech descendants can still be found in the villages of Croatian Baranja or Serbian Vojvodina. Aside from natural beauty, the Amazon of Europe is very rich in cultural heritage and local crafts that can be found in the cities and rural areas. Ancient castles, picturesque churches, museums, and traditional watermills are only a few examples of the most typical cultural attractions in the area. Moreover, many interesting festivals take place in the region including fairs, cultural, music, dance and cycling festivals that are very attractive for potential visitors. The rich natural and cultural heritage of the area therefore represents a great opportunity for further development and strengthening of the tourism economy in the region.

By plane

Red tape

Visas and Border Formalities

Citizens of EU member states, the European Economic Area (EEA) and Switzerland do not need a visa for entering the Republic of Austria. Nationals of other countries might require a visa in order to enter the Schengen Area or the Austrian territory. Please check the information on whether you require a visa or not on the website of the Federal Ministry of the Interior: www.bmi.gv.at/202/Fremdenpolizei_und_Grenzkontrolle/start.aspx.

Foreigners who are not nationals of an EEA state or Switzerland and who wish to pursue gainful employment or a short-term activity similar to gainful employment (e.g.





internship) always require a visa (see also »Temporary work visa«).

Nationals of those states for which the visa requirement has been lifted by means of an EU regulation are entitled to visa-free entry to Austria for a maximum of 90 days per 180 days in case of no gainful employment.

Money

The currency in Austria is the Euro and has been ever since January 1st, 2002. One Euro is made up of 100 cents. Major credit cards are accepted almost everywhere, but please do check card charges from your bank in foreign countries before the trip. Most card machines will offer you to pay in Euros or in your card currency. We recommend choosing the Euro option since the card operator might have very unfavourable rates for your card. Usually, your bank will give you the best exchange rate with Euro.

When tipping serving staff, Austrians normally add 5% to 15% to the bill so it's rounded up to a convenient number.

Healthcare

The nation of Austria has a two-tier health care system in which virtually all individuals receive publicly funded care, but they also have the option to purchase supplementary private health insurance. Care involving private insurance plans (sometimes referred to as "comfort class" care) can include more flexible visiting hours and private rooms and doctors. Some individuals choose to completely pay for their care privately.

Healthcare in Austria is universal for residents of Austria as well as those from other EU countries. Members of EU/EEA countries or Switzerland with national health insurance in their home country can use the European Health Insurance Card.





Telephone numbers, mobile number & internet

The international calling code for Austria is +43. There are only three major mobile network operators in Austria (A1 Telekom Austria, Magenta Telekom and Hutchison Drei Austria), but there are still many different providers of mobile communications.

Free WiFi: You can find free WiFi in a big majority of hotels, bars, pubs and restaurants. The service is usually free of charge; however guests may need to ask staff for login details. Many cities offer free WiFi throughout central areas.

Electricity

Austria uses 2-pin Schuko sockets and plugs. This is the same 2-pin system as in much of continental Europe.

From west to east, from apple strudel to Zwetschgendatschi (plum pastry), from locals for guests: Austria tastes unique. This is especially due to the people. Austrian hosts are full of passion for regional cuisine. There are specialities and moments of pleasure to be discovered in every region. Styria shines with two epithets: the Green Heart and the delicatessen of Austria. Between apple trees, vineyards and pumpkin fields, the gently hilly province attracts visitors with a variety of local and regional specialties.

The Vulkanland Route 66 road is the path that leads you to a zest for life in the Thermen- & Vulkanland. Packed along the 80 km route or situated just off it are all sorts of interactive factories and authentic family-run businesses where visitors can sample the wares, spend a few hours, and take home some souvenirs. On Route 66, everything is geared towards gourmet pleasure in the truest sense of the word. Every kilometre reveals new attractions in a seemingly endless landscape of culinary adventure: well-known gourmet stops, such as the Zotter Chocolate Adventure World, the Fromagerie (Austria's first cheese art and ripening factory), Gölles (a factory for fine brandies and vinegars), the Vulcano Schinkenmanufaktur (ham factory) or even the Berghofermühle (flour mill) in Fehring, to name but a few.



It's also well worth exploring smaller producers who specialise in niche products, for example Kober organic chokeberry farm, Koller pumpkin farm and workshop, Maika coffee roasting house, or the exciting Vulkanland snail farm.

Old fame: Riegersburg Crag first appeared in written records in 1138. The impressive basalt crag on which the castle was built was populated 6000 years ago already. With its extensive fortifications, the largest Baroque castle in Styria, was rightly known as the strongest fortress in the Occident. It was never taken. Recently, the castle has been extensively renovated and an inclined elevator has been installed to ease accessibility. Today it is one of the most famous tourist attractions in Styria. The changing exhibitions on witch-hunts, weaponry and castle life are always worth the climb.

Kornberg Castle

Arriving in Slovenia and transport

By plane



You can travel to Slovenia by air to the central Jože Pučnik International Airport or Maribor Edvard Rusjan Airport or to any of the airports in the neighbouring countries.

By bus



Slovenia's public transport network is well-developed and reliable. In general, local buses run several services a day on weekdays, reduced services on Saturdays and in some areas no services on Sundays. Major bus carriers: Avtobusni promet Murska Sobota (www.apms.si) and Arriva (arriva.si); FlixBus (www.flixbus.si), one of Europe's leading coach companies, also operates in Slovenia and offers connections between European cities.

By train



Slovene railways are well connected to all neighbouring countries. Several international routes and special offers exist for some destinations. Slovenia has an extensive railway network with more than 1,300 km of track connecting all major (and smaller) cities and towns across the country. Slovenian

Railways (www.slo-zeleznice.si) also provides frequent services to different destinations.

By car

The Slovene highway network is well connected to all neighbouring countries. Slovenia requires that all vehicles buy a vignette – »vinjeta« (road tax) before using motorways or expressways. Vignettes are usually sold at gas stations. The electronic vignette is a digital version of the vignette, and has replaced traditional vignette stickers on vehicles. It is linked to the vehicle registration number entered into the central tolling system upon the purchase of the electronic vignette. Always up to date touring information or traffic conditions can be found on pages of the Slovenian national automobile association – AMZS (www.amzs.si).

Red tape

Visas and Border Formalities

Citizens of the European Union do not need a visa or residence permit to enter the Republic of Slovenia. Entry is permitted based on a valid identity card or a valid passport for the first three months after entry; individuals may reside in Slovenia without residence registration. Third-country nationals who wish to enter and reside in the Republic of Slovenia for the purposes of tourism, business, personal visit, employment, study, family reunification or other forms or purposes of residence must obtain a visa (if required for entry into Slovenia) or a residence permit at a diplomatic





mission or consular post of the Republic of Slovenia abroad prior to their entry into the Republic of Slovenia. Slovenian diplomatic missions and consular posts issue Schengen visas (A and C type visa) and national visas (D type visa). To obtain a visa, a third-country national must submit the required documents and meet the conditions prescribed by law.

Slovenia is in the Schengen Area, which means that, in general, there are no checks at the border crossings with Italy, Austria and Hungary. To enter Slovenia from Croatia, it is sufficient to have a passport or an identity document, if the visit does not last more than three months.

Embassies

Contacts of Slovenia's diplomatic missions and consular posts in a specific country are available in the Country registry. Several countries have an embassy in Slovenia. If you require help offered by the embassies, you can contact them directly. If you are looking for an embassy of a specific country, use the website of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs



(www.gov.si/drzave). It contains an up to date list of all diplomatic missions of all the countries of the world, relative to Slovenia.

Money

From 1 January 2007 Slovenia has been using the Euro as official currency. The Slovenian currency before the Euro was the Tolar (SIT).

ATMs are literally everywhere and you shouldn't have problems finding one.

Credit cards are widely accepted.

Tipping in Slovenia is getting more and more common, but it is not obligatory. It is appreciated, polite and appropriate for a good service, though. Not tipping is ok, rounding up is welcome.

Healthcare

Medical care is very well spread across Slovenia. All Slovenian cities have health centers, while there are individual clinics in small towns. All Slovenian settlements are served by emergency medical assistance, even by helicopter if necessary.

The citizens of European Union Member States can travel to Slovenia with the European Health Insurance Card. This card can also be obtained by the citizens of Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Switzerland. A special agreement also applies to the citizens of Croatia, who can obtain health services in Slovenia with their health cards. For the citizens of all other countries, it is best that you take out international travel insurance even before travelling to Slovenia. This is also recommended for citizens of the above-mentioned countries.

For more detailed information on using health services, please refer to the Health Insurance Institute of Slovenia (www.zzzs.si).

For minor problems, such as colds, headaches, fever or insect bites, it is possible to obtain medications in pharmacies without prescription as well. The majority of Slovenian towns have pharmacies, while there are also 24-hour pharmacies in the cities.

Telephone numbers, mobile numbers & internet

The international calling code for Slovenia is 386, the prefix for international calls is 00, and the area code prefix is 0. Three mobile companies, Telekom Slovenije and Telemach, as well as A1, provide good GSM/HSDPA and LTE coverage. Roaming between European phone companies is free due to EU regulation, while calls to or from non-EU providers remain expensive. Pre-paid GSM SIM cards are widely available in supermarkets, post offices and gas stations. You can find free WiFi in a big majority of hotels, bars, pubs and restaurants. The service is usually free of charge, however guests may need to ask staff for login details. Some cities such as Ljubljana offer limited free WiFi throughout central areas.





Electricity

The mains electricity in Slovenia is 230 V, with a frequency of 50 Hz. Slovenia uses the so-called European plug with the official designation CEE 7/16. This plug is used in most other European countries.

Eating & drinking

Slovenia boasts a bounty of tasty dishes. Some are influenced by its neighbours Austria, Italy and Hungary while others are home-grown, but all are prepared with the freshest ingredients in season. Complementing all that goodness on the plate, the local wine, beer, fruit brandy and even water are also of the highest quality.

Pomurje cuisine is simple but full of flavour and made using ingredients provided by the local environment. Typical ingredients include buckwheat, pumpkin seed oil and minced lard, while poppy seeds are often used in desserts.



What to taste in Pomurje?

Prekmurje ham – dried pork thigh off the bone. It has a recognisable pear shape. It has been registered under the protection of geographical indication scheme, the highest form of protection for traditional foodstuffs.

Tünka meat – with minced lard, it makes for an excellent combination with vegetables and homemade bread. The wooden container traditionally used to preserve meat is known as a tünka.

Bograč is a type of goulash, originating from the Pannonian plain.

Dödöli – potato mush i.e. žganci. It goes perfectly with goulash, or as a main dish seasoned with cream.

Retaši – various types of strudel. They can be sweet (filled with fruit, cottage cheese, poppy seeds) or savoury (filled with cabbage or turnip). Different combinations of these fillings are also popular.

Prekmurska gibanica – unique dessert classed among the national dishes of Slovenia. The fillings used to make Prekmurska gibanica are divided by butter-brushed pastry sheets and layered in this exact order: poppy seeds, cottage cheese, ground walnuts, and grated apples.

- It has six cases, eight declensions and three grammatical genders

Island of love

A special type of boat or ferry has been preserved to demonstrate the ancient way of crossing the river. You can visit the permanent exhibit collection »Büiraštvo on the Mura river« in the »Bank House« where you will find out how the riverbanks of the Mura river used to be consolidated. There is also a tourist information office and a shop with handicrafted products, drinks, and tourist literature.

River School Velika Polana

The River School Velika Polana offers a unique insight into the floodplain forest and wet meadows in an interactive way that interprets the natural and cultural heritage of the area. Tinek's Ferry

In the past, Mr. Milan Pozderec, called Tinek, used a ferry to transport passengers, livestock, and cargo over the Mura river, until a bridge was built. A few years ago, a new ferry was installed. It runs from dawn till dusk on the route from Gornja Bistrica to Mota. It is used to transport a variety of loads, ranging from passenger cars, tractors, cyclists and pedestrians. The capacity of the ferry is up to 8 tons.

Vinarium Tower

By plane

Tudman or eight international airports situated in the continental part of the country (Zagreb, Osijek), along the coast (Split, Dubrovnik, Pula, Rijeka, Zadar) and on the islands (Mali Lošinj, Brač) or to any of the airports in the neighbouring countries (Graz or Vienna – Austria, Budapest – Hungary, Sarajevo – Bosnia and Herzegovina, Belgrade – Serbia, Venice – Italy). By bus



Croatia's public transport network is well-developed and reliable. Travelling by bus is popular and practical since they travel to or pass through the most interesting Croatian cities. The extensive network of bus carriers uses high-quality, safe and comfortable vehicles.

Major bus carriers are Arriva (www.arriva. com.hr/en) and Croatia Bus (getbybus.com/hr/). In addition, FlixBus (www.flixbus. hr) operates in Croatia as well. It is one of Europe's leading coach companies, which offers connections between European cities.

By train

Visas and Border Formalities

Citizens of the European Union do not need a visa or residence permit to enter the Republic of Croatia. The same applies for a few other non-EU-member countries in the region, such as Bosnia and Herzegovina, Serbia and Montenegro. Entry is permitted on the basis of a valid identity card or a valid passport. Passengers from other countries must have a valid passport, and some might need a visa. A visa is an authorization for: transit through the territory of the Republic of Croatia or a stay in the territory of the Republic of Croatia for a maximum duration of up to 90 days in any period of 180 days, transit through the international transit area of the airport.

Types of visas are: air transit visa (visa A), short-term visa (visa C). Visas are issued by diplomatic missions or consular offices of the Republic of Croatia abroad. They can also be issued by a diplomatic mission or a consular office of another country with which the Republic of Croatia has made an agreement on representation in issuing visas. 
The international calling code for Croatia is 385, the prefix for international calls is 00. Telephone area codes are divided by county.

Croatia has three main providers: Croatian telekom (Hrvatski telekom), A1 and Telemach. Roaming between European phone companies is free due to EU regulation, while calls to or from non-EU providers remain expensive. Pre-paid GSM SIM cards are widely available in post offices, gas stations and supermarkets.

You can find free WiFi in a vast majority of hotels, bars, pubs and restaurants. The service is usually free of charge, although guests may need to ask the staff for login details. Some cities offer limited free WiFi throughout their centers.

Electricity

the electric energy system in Croatia is the same as in the rest of Europe. All installations emit an alternating current of 220V/50Hz, and the sockets are type F (the so-called »Schuko« sockets). This means that European visitors (except for those from Great Britain and Ireland) won't require any adapters, while visitors coming from countries with a different system or socket standard should use standard EU adapters. In case you forget to bring an adapter, you can buy a new one in most shops offering electronic or IT equipment.

Food & drinks

Each region in Croatia has its own special culinary features that will impress you. In the continental regions of Croatia, there is a strong Hungarian, Viennese and Turkish influence in meat and vegetable dishes as well as desserts.

Slavonia offers traditional flavours with specialties such as čobanac, fish stew, ham, kulen and kulenova seka, salenjak pastry prepared in the traditional way with pork fat, strudel pies filled with apples and walnuts. Famous Slavonian wines such as Ilok Traminac, Kutjevo Riesling and Graševina perfectly complement these delicious specialties.

The central region (Podravina, Zagorie, Međimurie) is

known for the Međimurje layer cake called gibanica, pumpkin oil, pasta with cabbage, orehnjača and makovnjača (walnut and poppyseed rolls), as well as wines, such as the Pušipel from Međimurje. Delight in the flavours of traditional specialties from Zagorje such as buckwheat porridge, zlevanka pie or a typical Zagorje specialty, turkey with a traditional flatbread called mlinci or the famous Bregofska pie from Podravina.

What to taste?

Čvarci – Fried snacks made from pig rind (pork scratchings), known to Croats as čvarci, are one of the most famous dishes in northern and eastern Croatia and a distinctive element of Croatian cuisine.

Čobanac – Several kinds of meat are used in čobanac, mostly pork and beef, and sometimes wild game or lamb and many types of vegetables and seasonings such as bay leaves, salt, pepper and, naturally, ground sweet and hot red peppers which give čobanac its famous red colour. One of the main characteristics of this dish is its spiciness, which is enhanced by adding dried spicy chilli peppers.

Zagorje štrukli or štruklji – A traditional specialty from Hrvatsko Zagorje. Štrukli can be prepared in two ways, cooking and baking. The basic dough filled with cottage cheese is used in both methods. However, the štrukli cooked in salted water can be covered with melted fat and sprinkled with toasted breadcrumbs when served.

Medimurje gibanica – The basic element of this interesting cake is the thinly stretched puff pastry, specially made for it. In between the pastry, rich layers of fillings (walnuts, poppyseed, apples and cheese) provide various textures and tastes which complement each other perfectly.



Bregofska pie – A traditional dish of the Koprivnica region. In 2012, it was included in the list of intangible cultural assets of the Republic of Croatia. It is prepared from home-made dough, apples, raisins and walnuts.

Language

Croatian is the official language of the Republic of Croatia. The Croatian language has three dialects: Shtokavian, Kajkavian and Chakavian.




Trakošćan Castle

Regional Park Mura Drava in Podravina



The Regional Park Mura Drava covers the routes of the Mura and Drava rivers in Croatia and is the largest protected area in the Koprivnica-Križevci County. The protected area of the Drava river in this location is full of side channels, sandbars, and eroded steep riverbanks, floodplains with backwaters, oxbow lakes, abandoned riverbeds, meanders and riparian forests, and is home to many protected and rare plant and animal species. Marian sanctuary Molve

Visit Molve and discover why this picturesque settlement is a central pilgrimage place for catholic believers from the region and surrounding areas.

Old town of Đurđevac

The tower has a platform for visitors at the height of 21 metres, with the overall height of the tower being 28 metres. It was built with laminated timber according to a star-shaped floor plan and it has perforated metal steps. The new observation deck provides a lovely view of the scenic beauties of the northernmost county in Croatia, the hills and vineyards of Međimurje, and a view of four countries - Austria, Slovenia, Hungary and, when the weather is nice, even Slovakia.

Up there in the northernmost point in Croatia, in the village of Žabnik, the Mura river turns the impressive wheel of a wooden mill. It is a unique example of traditional architectural heritage in Croatia. The water murmur and the creaking sound of grindstone take visitors back to the long gone 1902 when flour was ground for the first time on that floating <code>>>> oldster*</code>.

The »Miller's educational path« was built in idyllic natural surroundings by the mill. Apart from offering a walk in untouched nature, the educational path also presents a multitude of interesting facts about natural and traditional heritage of the Significant Landscape of the river Mura. There is also a river raft that, just like a perpetuum mobile, takes people and vehicles from one river bank to the other, without a motor, sails or oars.

Practical and basic information

Arriving in Hungary and transport

By plane



You can travel to Hungary by airplane to the central Budapest Ferenc Liszt International Airport, Debrecen International Airport or Hévíz-Balaton Airport. Furthermore, the country is accessible from any of the airports in the neighbouring countries.

By bus





In Hungary, FlixBus (www.flixbus.hu), and Regiojet (www.regiojet.hu) also operate, offering intercity bus connections with many European cities.

By train

The Hungarian railways are well connected to all neighbouring countries and connect the most important cities, towns, and villages in each region. Similarly to Hungarian passengers, EU citizens are also entitled to various discounts over the course of their travel in Hungary. Detailed information and all schedules can be found here: www.mavcsoport.hu.

Furthermore, the Austrian Railways company (ÖBB) operates daily highspeed trains between Budapest and many Austrian, German, and Swiss destinations.

By car

The Hungarian highway network is well connected to all neighbouring countries and covers almost the whole territory of Hungary. In Hungary, it is a requirement to buy a vignette — »autópályamatrica« (road tax) before using motorways or expressways. Vignettes are usually sold at gas stations, but online purchasing is also available (www.autopalyamatrica.hu).

Visas and Border Formalities

Hungary is a party to the Schengen Agreement, which allows for free movement between certain European countries. Citizens of the European Union do not need a visa or residence permit to enter Hungary. Entry is permitted based on a valid identity card or a valid passport for 90 days after entry; individuals may reside in Hungary without residence registration. More information:

Hungary is in the Schengen Area, which means that, in general, there are no checks at the border crossings with Austria, Slovenia and Slovakia. To enter Hungary from Croatia, Romania and Serbia it is sufficient to have a passport or an identity document, if the visit does not last more than 90 days.

Embassies

Contacts of Hungary's diplomatic missions and consular posts in a specific country are available in the Country registry. Several countries have an embassy in Hungary. If you need help that is offered by the embassies, you can contact them directly.

Money

In Hungary, the official currency is the Hungarian Forint (HUF). ATMs are available mainly in bigger settlements or towns; in some villages ATMs cannot be found. Most of the ATMs are not able to provide euros for users, only the Hungarian Forint is available.

Credit cards are widely accepted in Hungary, but in rural areas it is strongly recommended to have smaller amounts of cash (10.000 or 20.000 HUF).

EUR in cash is only accepted in bigger hotels or supermarkets.

Tipping in Hungary is common, but not obligatory. It is appreciated, polite and appropriate for a good service, though. In several cases, you can tip by credit card as well.

Healthcare

Almost all Hungarian cities have health centers or hospitals, additionally private clinics can be found even in small towns. All Hungarian settlements are served by emergency medical assistance, even by helicopter if necessary. The citizens of European Union Member States can travel to Hungary with the European Health Insurance Card. This card can also be obtained by the citizens of Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Switzerland. For citizens of all





other countries, it is best that you take out international travel insurance before travelling to Hungary.

Roaming between European phone companies is free due to EU regulation, while calls to or from non-EU providers remain expensive. Pre-paid GSM SIM cards



are widely available in supermarkets, post offices and gas stations.

You can find free WiFi in a big majority of hotels, bars, pubs, and restaurants. The service is usually free of charge; however, guests may need to ask staff for login details. Some bigger cities offer limited free WiFi throughout central areas.

Electricity

The mains electricity in Hungary is 230 V, with a frequency of 50 Hz. Hungary uses the so-called European plug with the official designation CEE 7/16. This is the plug used in most other European countries. Guests coming from certain European countries will have to provide the appropriate adapter.

Eating & drinking

Gastronomy has always played an important role in Hungarian culture. It is characterised by both tradition and innovation, as well as creative ideas and solutions inspired by a heritage of many centuries. Hungary has very popular and famous soups like the iconic goulash and fish soups, which are prepared in myriad variations, both in restaurants and at home. The other famous meal in Hungary is the »Pörkölt« — a dish of stewed meat —an archetypical Hungarian dish. Its precise preparation is the subject of passionate debate: ask a handful of Hungarians and you'll get at least a dozen opinions.

On the sweeter side, Hungary excels in desserts. Hearty Gundel pancakes are filled with a walnut/rum mixture smothered in dark-chocolate sauce, Somlói sponge cake is vanilla-flavoured with chocolate sauce, rum and raisins, while túrógombóc is sweet cottage cheese dumplings with a sweet-sour cream sauce. The most iconic cakes are the classic Dobos and Esterházy, while Hungary also created the walnut-apricot zserbó slice and the apricot-cottage-cheese Rákóczi túrós.

Hungary is one of Europe's most intriguing historic wineproducing countries, but it remains a blank spot in the world's wine map for many wine-lovers. The country is in the unique position of being one of the oldest winemaking countries, yet it is still re-introducing itself to the world—a process that began in the early 1990s after Communism ended and the modern Hungarian wine industry was born. Hungary has 6 larger wine regions.




Language

The Hungarian language is the official language in Hungary, which is part of the Uralic language family. The language is complex and unique: despite the country's location in central Europe, it is fundamentally different from every spoken language in the neighbouring countries — and it is one of the hardest languages in the world to learn. In terms of dialects, there are no major differences within the country.

Mohács National Memorial Site

The Mohács National Memorial Site is a 1.5 km detour off the Amazon of Europe route towards Sátorhely. The Memorial is devoted to the battle of the Hungarians against the Turks in 1526. The lost battle – being a turning point for the whole of Central Europe – had a great influence on the 150 year-long Turkish rule. The park is home of the grave of 1700 soldiers and of King Louis II. The Memorial has a visitors' center with an exhibition including interactive features.

Béda Protection Area

The Béda Protected Area, which is part of the Danube-Drava National Park, is located between Mohács and the state border, along the Danube. You can get acquainted with the vivid wildlife of the area (including the famous, but shy black stork) by visiting the Museum of the White Stork in Kölked, and the Nagypartos study trail. The National Park often organises tours by carriage, canoe or bicycle. From the Külső-Béda a detour can be made on the asphalted dike to the state border with Croatia.

Mohács is a town of 17 thousand inhabitants, located on both sides of the Danube river. The main attraction of the town is the Busó Festival (»Poklade« in Croatian), a local one-week event every February, which is under UNESCO protection as Spiritual Heritage. The Poklade is a carnival event of the local Šokci people, during which the local busó's cross the Danube in their traditional wooden masks, and burn a bonfire on the main square with a coffin of the winter. You may get familiar with the tradition by visiting the Busó Court open all year long. Out of the numerous churches of the town, the byzantine style Votive Church on the main square is the one that stands out the most. It is also recommended to pay a visit to the St. Michael water- and treadmill, which is a unique experience. The mill is open only if you make a reservation/request.

Arriving in Serbia and transport

There are several ways to get to Serbia and the West Bačka district, City of Sombor and Apatin municipality.

By plane



You can travel to Serbia by air to the central Nikola Tesla International Airport or to any of the airports in the neighbouring countries.

By bus



Serbia's public transport network is well developed. In general, local buses run several lines a day on weekdays to larger cities. Buses go less often to smaller towns. Main bus carriers: Lasta a.d. Belgrade (www.lasta.rs) and ATP Severtrans Sombor (www.severtrans.rs); they also offer connections between European cities.

By train



The total length of the railway network in Serbia is 3,808.7 km, of which 3,533.2 km are single-track and 275.5 km are double-track. Since March 2022, the first new

high-speed train has been running on the reconstructed line between Belgrade and Novi Sad. This is the first high-speed train in the history of Serbian railways, and the most modern in the region (www.srbvoz.rs).

By car

The highway network in Serbia is well connected with all neighbouring countries. Tolls are paid at toll booths. You can always get up-to-date information about the roads or the traffic situation on the pages of the Automobile Association of Serbia – AMSS (www.amss.org.rs).

Visas and Border Formalities

On October 30, 2014, the Government of the Republic of Serbia adopted the Decision on visa-free entry into the Republic of Serbia for holders of foreign national passports who have a valid Schengen visa, a visa of Great Britain and other member states of the European Union, or a visa of the United States of America, as well as for holders of foreign national passports that have a regulated stay in Schengen zone countries, European Union Member States or the United States of America. With this decision, the aforementioned categories of foreign citizens can, without prior application for a visa, enter, travel through and stay in

the Republic of Serbia for up to 90 days during a six-month period, but not exceeding the expiration date of the said visas or residence permits.

It is possible for foreign citizens to enter the Republic of Serbia with two passports, e.g. an outdated national passport with a valid visa or residence permit and a valid national passport without a valid visa or residence permit. Foreign citizens, who have a residence permit in the form of a special card (not a sticker affixed to their passport), must present their valid passport when entering the territory of the Republic of Serbia (www.mfa.gov.rs).

The state border is crossed at the border crossing with a valid travel document or other document prescribed for crossing the state border, during the working hours of the





border crossing and in accordance with the international agreement.

The working hours of border crossings that are not open 24 hours are visibly marked with special signs.

Embassies

Contacts of Serbian diplomatic and consular missions in a certain country are available in the state register. Several countries have embassies in Serbia. If you need help offered by embassies, you can contact them directly. If you are looking for a country's embassy, use the website of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (www.mfa.gov.rs/en). It contains an up-to-date list of all diplomatic missions of all countries in the world in relation to Serbia.

Money

Serbia uses the dinar as its official currency (RSD).

ATMs are literally everywhere and you should have no problem finding them.

Credit cards are widely accepted and you can use them almost everywhere.

Healthcare

In Serbia, there are health care institutions at the primary, secondary and tertiary levels of health care. When the health problem exceeds the technical conditions of the hospital or a professional opinion of the highest level of health care is needed, the patient is referred to clinical centers of which there are 4 (Belgrade, Novi Sad, Kragujevac and Niš) or one of the clinics (6), i.e. institutes (16) or KBCs (4). These represent the tertiary and last level in the health care system of Serbia. For all visits to doctors at the tertiary level, you need a referral from your doctor from a health center, which they issue based on the recommendation of the doctor from the hospital. This referral must be certified by the competent branch of the Republic Institute for Health Insurance (RZZO).

In order to regulate your stay in the Republic of Serbia, it is necessary to have a voluntary health insurance policy issued in the Republic of Serbia.

Telephone numbers, mobile number & internet

When calling Serbia from another country, enter <code>>oo<</code> or <code>>+<</code>, then the area code for Serbia (<code>>381<</code>), then the two-digit area code of the telephone district (without o for local calls), and finally the six-digit telephone number within the telephone network circle.

Three mobile companies, Telekom Srbija, Yettel and A1, provide good GSM/HSDPA and LTE coverage. Roaming between European phone companies is free due to EU regulation, while calls to or from non-EU providers are still expensive. Pre-paid GSM SIM cards are widely available in supermarkets, post offices and gas stations.

You can find free WiFi in most hotels, bars, pubs and restaurants. The service is usually free, but guests may need to ask staff for log-in details.

Electricity

The mains electricity in Serbia is 230 V, with a frequency of 50 Hz. Serbia uses the so-called European plug with the official designation CEE 7/16. This is the plug used in most other European countries. Guests coming from certain European countries will have to provide the appropriate adapter.

Eating & drinking

Serbian cuisine is heterogeneous, although stormy historical events have also affected the diet of the people, so each region has its own specificities and differences. It can be said that the decisive influences were Byzantine-Greek, therefore – Mediterranean, then Oriental and Austro-Hungarian. Food preparation is an integral part of Serbian tradition and culture.

Serbia boasts an abundance of delicious dishes. Some are influenced by their neighbours, while others are homemade, but all are prepared from the freshest ingredients in season. Along with all that goodness on the plate, you can also enjoy high-quality homemade wines and fruit spirits.

What to taste in Vojvodina?

Vojvodina cuisine is a mixture of different cuisines of the peoples who have lived in this area for centuries. Of the main meat dishes, dishes such as goulash, stew, tokanja, perkelt and ajmok are important, which are prepared with an abundant use of onions, tomatoes and other types of vegetables, with various spices, such as ground red pepper. Fish stew and homemade strudel with poppy seeds are an indispensable part of the traditional diet in the territory of Vojvodina.



Language

Serbian is the official language of Serbia.

Particularities of the Serbian language:

- → The Serbian alphabet has 30 Cyrillic letters. The basic characteristic of the modern alphabet is that it is phonetic, which means that one symbol or letter corresponds to one sound.
- There are seven cases.
- It has over 10 dialects.

The Painting »The Battle of Senta« is the work of Hungarian artist of German descent MA Ferencz Eisenhut. It was commissioned for the Millennium Exhibition, organized in 1896 in Pest, to commemorate the Hungarians' 1000th anniversary in the Pannonian Plain. Today it is located in Sombor, in the City Administration building in Županija. The canvas itself is huge: 7 metres wide and 4 metres high (28 m² in total). With a richly gilded half-metre-wide frame that is a work of art in itself, the total area of the painting is 40 m². These dimensions make the Battle of Senta the largest oil on canvas, not only in Serbia but also in the former Yugoslavia.

Sombor Theatre

On 25 November 1882, the first ever performance was held in the Sombor Theatre building and it has been developing ever since. It has always been a home for the most prominent directors and actors who perform great domestic and world theatre classics and avantgarde drama literature. Since 1993, each theatre season ends with the Theatre Marathon Festival. During three days and nights, one after the other, performances of guest theatres, theatre groups and students of drama faculties continuously alternate on stage. It is a manifestation, or rather a journey, which has most certainly outgrown local, even state boundaries.

The »Miki« Zoo is located in Kolut and is the only private zoo in the country. It was founded in 1988. The zoo has over 100 animal species from all over the world on an area of about seven and a half hectares of woods, lawns and a dozen artificial lakes. Only in this garden and in Frankfurt can you see two species of flamingos (ordinary and dwarf) and rare secretary birds. In the zoo in Kolut there are bustards, Livingston's turk, raja utva or orinoco geese, fallow deer, donkeys, ponies, white and black swans, pythons, monkeys, squirrels. The zoo also has a bear that was brought over from Frankfurt. The bear is unique in that its parents are a grizzly bear and a polar bear.

Mesarske livade is a place where civilization and untouched nature meet. 

Feldbach (Austria)



Stadtgemeinde Feldbach

Feldbach is the fifth largest town in Styria and the district capital of south-eastern Styria, located directly on the Vulkanland ROUTE 66 and the Schlösserstraße. Highlights include the most colourful church tower in the world and the Decalogue Trail, which is a sculptural implementation of the 10 Commandments. Right next door is the Museum im Tabor, where you

can experience life in south-eastern Styria from the Stone Age to the recent past. The picturesque old town alleys bear witness to the contemplative tranquillity of times long past. One landmark – the »Steinerne Metzen«, a medieval grain measure – stands directly in front of the town hall. In addition, well-marked cycling and hiking trails entice visitors to actively enjoy nature.

Fehring (Austria)

Due to its perfect geographical location in the heart of the Styrian thermal springs and wine country, Fehring is the ideal starting point for many excursions, such as to Riegersburg,

Murska Sobota (Slovenia)

Murska Sobota lies in the heart of the lowlands of Prekmurje. In the proximity of a large river and easy access have always made it an attractive destination for the population. Murska Sobota was first mentioned as a town in 1366. Since the middle ages it has been the center of different administrative and judicial functions. In the 1950's it acquired several regional institutions, becoming the center of Pomurje, the geographic and statistical region, which connects the Slovenian part of Pannonia with regions on both banks of the Mura river - Prekmurje on the left and Styria on the right. Today, Murska Sobota is the center of the northernmost Slovenian municipality with a population of 19,000 inhabitants. The name »Sobota« originates from Saturday fairs, and later the adjective »Murska« was added because of the Mura River.

Ljutomer (Slovenia)

Set in the heart of the Prlekija region, the town of Ljutomer is most known for three things, namely harness racing, film and wine. »Lotmerk«, as the locals

call it, boasts a rich cultural heritage and some trailblazing events. Some that went down as the most significant in the country's history took place in this very town. The first mass rally (»tabor«) in support of a united Slovenia was held in Ljutomer in 1868, the first motionpicture films in Slovenia were made here, the first dedicated harness racing club in the country was formed in

Ljutomer, and last but not least, the first Slovenian self-serve grocery store was opened downtown some 60 odd years ago. Many significant figures hailing from the region left their mark in the history pages both locally and abroad.

Lendava (Slovenia)



The town of Lendava is located in the far east of Slovenia, near the Slovenian-Hungarian and Slovenian-Croatian borders. It lies at the foot of the Lendava Mountains, not far from the Mura

river. Its inhabitants are Slovenians, Hungarians, Croats and members of other nations. Based on a rich cultural tradition, the town formed a natural multicultural environment, which defines the town and the municipality. The municipality has the status of an ethnically mixed municipality, as in its settlements – except for Benica and Hotiza – the autochthonous Hungarian ethnic community lives alongside the majority Slovene community.

Varaždin (Croatia)

The town of Varaždin stands out from the line of Central-European towns and cities presenting itself to its visitors as a rare urban jewel. Indeed, Varaždin has managed to preserve some of the most important features of the so-called Croatian »Vienna« as the town of baroque, music and flowers, making it a cosy resting point for its visitors.

Čakovec (Croatia)

Čakovec is a town in northern Croatia and the county seat of Međimurje County, a region situated between the Mura and Drava rivers. Čakovec is the administrative, economic and cultural center of Međimurje County. The town



takes pride in the variety of its trading, gastronomic, sports and recreational offer. It used to be famous for the well-developed textile industry which still has its fair share in the economy, but also for construction, graphic and printing industries, metalworking, engineering and food industries. Both production companies and small businesses have introduced other fields which are gaining importance such as processing of plastic, IT and various other industries, thus matching the demands of the modern market.

Koprivnica (Croatia)

Pécs has good transport connections (highway network and public transport) with Budapest and the Villány/Mohács region.

Nagykanizsa (Hungary)

city in Zala county with good public transport and highway connections with Budapest, and the city itself is relatively close to the Amazon of Europe. The heyday of the city dates back to the Middle Ages.

Szigetvár (Hungary)

Apatin (Serbia)

Apatin has an extremely favorable geographical position. The proximity of the river and the natural resources of this region (fertile soil, forests by the river, abundance of fish on the hills and backwaters and wild game in the forests) have always attracted people to settle here, so cultures have changed since prehistoric times. Sarmatians, Celts, Goths and other nations have inhabited this area. Apatin was mentioned for the first time in written documents in 1011, and was named after the abbey of the Kaločka diocese.

Floodplain landscape of the Mura River (Austria)

The floodplain landscape of the Mura River is a unique highlight of nature and culture. The Mura and its unique shore landscape are part of the first UNESCO biosphere reserve, which extends over five countries. In Styria, the section of the Mura between Murfeld and Bad Radkersburg is of particular importance. In the middle of this pristine floodplain landscape, a unique mill floats on the Mura river. It is one of the last floating ship mills in Central Europe.

Geo Info Kapfenstein (Austria)



The museum »Geo-Info Kapfenstein«, sees itself as a supplement to the Geo-Trail Kapfenstein and a starting point for visiting geologically interesting places in the Thermen- & Vulkanland. Lava flows and ash showers as well as »olivine bombs« tell of a dynamic development in the Styrian Volcanic Land. The exhibition in Kapfenstein

provides insights into the landscape changes of a region with a lot of (earth) history. Geo-Info Kapfenstein is a museum for the presentation of the geological development in and around Kapfenstein, as well as the Styrian Volcanic Land.

Tourist and Recreation Center and the Father of Pannonian oaks (Slovenia)

This beautiful tourist destination with its amazing surroundings of several fishponds and beautiful nature gives you the opportunity to perform various activities and play different sports. It is a perfect place for relaxation, alone or in company. Right nearby is the Father of Panonnian oaks, the remains of a giant, magnificent, centuries old oak tree. It crashed into the water from the banks of the Mura more than 1350 years ago. It was not encountered until 1999, during the rehabilitation of abandoned gravel pits. In 2005, the trunk was completely excavated and is exhibited under a thatched roof, reminiscent of old Pannonian homesteads.

Lisjakova struga Forest Park (Slovenia)

The forest park of Lisjakova struga is a natural treasure, dedicated to recreation, relaxation and to becoming familiar with our natural inheritance. In Lisjakova struga, there are a few types of trees that are protected by

the state or locally, such as the black cottonwood (Populus nigra L.) and the white willow (Salix alba). Both young and old can benefit from the rich natural conditions. Pre-school and school children come to visit the learning path of Lisjakova struga, where they become familiar with the local plants and animals, which they can study and examine all year long, in all seasons.

It is a place where you can organise a picnic, have fun, play different sports and, of course, fish!

Stork Land Park (Slovenia)

In the center of the village of Velika
Polana is the Stork Land Park. Here
you can find various indigenous
plant and tree species characteristic

the park. The park exhibits awards
received by the municipality in various

florale of Europe for the most beautiful
place in Europe, the most beautiful

market town in Slovenia, the most beautiful excursion place in Slovenia of the year and others.

The Drava River (Croatia)



The Drava River is a part of the recently proclaimed UNESCO World Biosphere Reserve Mura-Drava-Dunav. With its preserved nature, the river provides an adventurous experience, since there are various enjoyable options such as rafting, SUP or driving around in a

legendary safari jeep.

Regional Park Mura-Drava in Međimurje (Croatia)



The Mura-Drava Regional Park extends over the territory of 3 cities and 13 municipalities, covering a total area of 87,680.52 ha, of which 16,962.54 ha (19.4%) belong to Medimurje County. The Mura and Drava rivers are characterized by a high level of biological diversity, which is due to the fact that they are among the last rivers with natural flows in Central Europe. They are wet habitats that are

among the most endangered in Europe, and they are also protected in the Republic of Croatia: floodplain forests, wet grasslands, dead backwaters, abandoned riverbeds and meanders, shoals and steep eroded shores where strictly protected species nest. The Park contains 37 out of 60 classified rare and endangered habitat types, with the wider Drava area being categorized as an important area for birds in the EU.

Sands of Durđevac (Croatia)



This interesting natural phenomenon, also known as the Bloody Sands and the Croatian Sahara, is located near the town of Đurđevac. The area of the remaining sands has been declared a special geographical and botanical reserve and is a distinctive habitat important for preserving unique sand vegetation. While visiting the Sands of Đurđevac, stop by the Visitors center and learn about the creation of this natural phenomenon during the last Little Ice Age and the connection between this process and the Drava river.

Nature Park Kopački rit (Croatia)

Kopački rit is a nature park located in the corner of the Danube and the Drava tributaries. It is one of the most preserved floodplains in Europe and the largest land delta of the Danube, including the Special Zoological Reserve as the most valuable part of



the Park. The entire area is known as the habitat of numerous waterfowl, the population of common terns and its most important inhabitant – the golden eagle, which is also the symbol of the Park.

Old Plane tree in Letenye (Hungary)

The 500 years old sycamore tree is the symbol of Letenye; it stands in the garden of Szapáry-Andrássy castle in city center. The tree's trunk is 6.15 m wide and 20 m tall, with an average canopy diameter of 36 m.

The forest reserve's speciality and beauty come from certain

sub-Mediterranean effects which predominate the continental climate of the area and the soil of the forest with luvisol, which provide excellent living conditions for the forest. No forest farming activities have been carried out in the beech reservation for more than 40 years so everything you can see there has been formed by nature. The arboretum is situated about three kilometres from Kistolmács, Kiscsehi and Bázakerettye. 132 types of pineneedled and 88 types of leafy trees were planted in the park. The arboretum becomes a real fairy garden in spring when azaleas bloom; silver fir, sequoia and cypress populations give you a special spectacle all year long.

Mailáthpuszta, Kisinci oxbow lake (Hungary)

Leaving the route towards Szaporca you can pass by the beautiful Kisinci oxbow lake, where a river viewpoint



and a furnished rest area are available. The oxbow lake, which is part of the river bed of the Ancient Drava, is an internationally protected Ramsar site.

Gyékényes (Hungary)

The gravel pit lake is the largest landmark of Gyékényes on the Hungarian-Croatian border. The gravel mines have been operating near the village since 1920 and the water of the lake is so clear that the visibility under water can reach up to 8 meters. The lake is a real fishing paradise, a favourite spot for swimmers and divers.

Upper Danube (Serbia)



Due to the wealth of exceptional natural values, the Upper Danube Region in Serbia was declared an area of

importance for birds (IBA) in 1989. It is an integral part of the »Drava-Mura« biosphere reserve and is included in the list of potential wetlands of the Ramsar Convention. The Gornje Podunavlje Special Nature Reserve was placed under state protection on 20 July 2001 as a first category natural state asset. The Upper Danube Region is of enormous ecological importance in the preservation, protection and improvement of natural resources.

Banks of the Danube in Apatin (Serbia)



On the banks of the Danube River in Apatin there are countless beautiful locations perfect for anglers, swimmers, bird and nature lovers. What fascinates everyone who comes to Apatin is the view of the river, especially during sunset. It is impossible to remain indifferent and not keep that image in your head. From winter walks along the coast and observing the frozen Danube, to spring boating to summer camping and swimming, to autumn fishing, the Danube near Apatin is a natural wealth of enormous proportions.

Lavabräu (Austria)



In the Auersbach »Atelier für Gebrautes«, fervent enthusiasm is turned into cool brewes. The small brewery in the heart of the Vulkanland is also a multiple award-winning whisky manufactory. Carefully selected ingredients of organic quality and intensive involvement with production create incomparably tasty beers and exceptional whiskies, which you can taste on an excursion through the

manufactory and of course also buy in the brewery shop.

By the way: A few steps further you will find the Johannisbrunnen healing water museum.

Church of St. Trinity and the Hadiks mummy (Slovenia)

On the way to Lendava you can see, from a long distance, hills planted with picturesque vineyards and among them an ancient church dedicated to the Holy Trinity, the protector of Lendava. In the tomb of the church you can see the naturally mummified body of General Mihael Hadik, one of the greatest heroes in the battles with the Turks. The church represents the charm of the history of Lendava.

Babič Mill on the Mura River (Slovenia)

If you want to experience something new, make sure you pay a visit to the Babič Mill, which is the only Pannonian floating mill in the area today, a unique monument of Slovenian cultural heritage of inestimable value. The Babič Mill is a local, ethnographic, historical and tourist feature of Prlekija and thus the Pomurje region.

Murska Sobota Castle (Slovenia)

Together with its park, the Murska Sobota Castle is an important center of cultural and social events in the town. Since 1956, it has housed the Regional Pomurje Museum of Murska Sobota, featuring a permanent exhibition on the life of the people on the Mura from the first settlement to the present, the Kološa Cabinet of Art Photography, based on the legacy of the local art photographer Jože Kološa, and a permanent exhibition of portraits of Slovene impressionists by Drago Tršar. The museum's activities are completed by occasional thematic exhibitions, workshops, and other contents for children and adults, as well as a museum shop with select products. The castle also houses the Youth Information and Culture Club (MIKK), which organises programmes of modern visual arts and music by young artists, select concerts, and presentations in the club's café. There is also a multi-purpose hall for minor stage performances and shows, events, and meetings.

The first thing that comes to mind when thinking of Varaždin is the sight of the Old Town, the most important and most magnificent historical building in the town. The construction of the castle lasted from the 14th to the 19th century and it now houses the collections of the oldest Culture and History department of the Varaždin City Museum.

Treasury of Medimurje (Croatia)

The Museum of Intangible Heritage »Treasury of Međimurje Čakovec«

is located in the fortification of the Old Town of Zrinski in Čakovec. The complex of the Old Town of Zrinski in Čakovec is the largest profane monument of Medimurje County with the status of protected immovable cultural property of national significance for the Republic of Croatia. The name Zrinski was given after the famous family of Croatian bans (counts) and fearless warriors - the defenders of the borders of the Hungarian-Croatian kingdom against the invasion of the Ottomans, the Zrinski family.

Hlebine School of naive art (Croatia)

Hlebine is the birthplace of the world famous Hlebine School of naive art. This form of art is a glass painting technique used by self-taught artists from the rural area and it was quite popular during the second half of the 20th century. The works of naive painters and sculptors are on display at the Naive Art Gallery in Hlebine, as well as in various other galleries in the Podravina region. Visit Hlebine and see

the best pieces of naive art, explore the Gallery Roads of Podravina and enjoy the cultural and artistic offer of the local artists.

Holy Trinity Square in Osijek (Croatia)

Located in the old part of Osijek called Tvrđa, it was built in 1729 as a votive statue of the people of Osijek to God so that the plague that ravaged the city would not return.

Reformed church in Drávaiványi (Hungary)



The dominant religion of the Ormánság area is Calvinism. Churches in the area are typical for their painted wooden coffered ceilings. The most beautiful example of these church interiors is found in Drávaiványi, a village half-way between Drávasztára and Sellye.

Abandoned village in Révfalu (Hungary)



Between Felsőszentmárton and Drávasztára make sure you don't miss out Révfalu (Drvljanci), an abandoned village in the floodplain, now part of the Danube-Drava National Park. There you can see the remains of traditional local architecture. During summertime the place is popular among artists and hikers. Its best-known landmark is the small local chapel in the center of the former village.

Lovászi bunker (Hungary)

The bunker system in South-Zala was built in the middle of the 20th century; one of the most spectacular parts can be found in Lovászi. Over the course of an approximately 13 km long walking tour, you can visit establishments on and under the ground, including a 1 km long underground bunker.

Busó House (Hungary)

The Busó festivities are a tradition stemming from a few thousand-year-old nature-praising belief system: its source

was the worship of the mythological figure of the God Pan. It was a celebration of the ancient tribes, pastors and forest men from the Adriatic to the Balaton. It is a wonder that against all prohibitions of the Church and the unprofessional treatment of it, the tradition is still preserved nowadays.

The City Museum of Sombor (Serbia)

The city museum consists of several departments: archaeological, numismatic, ethnological, historical and the department for the history



of domestic art and the collection of contemporary Yugoslav art. The museum has a collection of valuable books from the 18th, 19th and 20th centuries. The Gallery of Contemporary Yugoslav Art is located in the building of the museum itself and has a collection of various works of art. The annual art exhibition »Fall Art Gallery« was started by our most famous painter Milan Konjović.

Tourism organization of thecity of Sombor

Among the numerous monuments of the material cultural heritage of Apatin, the Baroque statue of the Mother of God or the Black Madonna, made of ebony, is especially outstanding. It was brought in one of the waves of Maria Theresa's colonization. The Virgin is presented in a standing, counterpoise posture with a small Christ in the left and gold-plated sceptre in the right hand.

TBR MDD

The International Co-ordinating Council of UNESCO's Man and the Biosphere Programme (UNESCO MAB-ICC) designated the Mura-Drava-Danube Transboundary Biosphere Reserve (TBR MDD) as the world's first 5-country biosphere reserve. Stretching across Austria, Slovenia, Croatia, Hungary and Serbia, the reserve covers a total area of 930,000 hectares extending along 700km of the Mura, Drava and Danube rivers, which makes it the largest riverine biosphere reserve in Europe. It comprises about 300,000 hectares of core and buffer zones (existing protected area network) and around 700,000 hectares of transition zones.

Amazon of Europe

The name »Amazon of Europe« describes the area of the three transboundary rivers Mura, Drava and Danube and was introduced by WWF in 2009 with the aim to strengthen the conservation of these uniquely preserved riverine landscapes. Though there is only one Amazon in the world, the Mura-Drava-Danube area is comparable with the Amazon. When experiencing the area from within and being present at the river you have a strong feeling of being in the real Amazon. The name also suggests these rivers and their floodplains' significance as one of the most bio diverse areas in Europe. Meanwhile, the Amazon of Europe has become a widely known and used brand for the international Mura-Drava-Danube River landscape.


